## **SUMMER and A Changing Climate**

As I write, we have the first real hint that summer may be just around the corner ... or it may not! If there is one thing which we in the UK can say with any certainty it is that our weather is unpredictable. Having said that, there are things which we can predict, either because they are set firm in the calendar as Diana writes about elsewhere, or because all the available evidence points in that direction.

When we consider the pattern of our weather in recent years, and compare it to the past (even within living memory) it is clear that things are changing. Scientists tell us that our world is getting warmer and that this fact will inevitably lead to further changes in weather patterns not just here but for the whole world. For some, the prospect of warmer, drier summers in the UK may seem quite attractive, especially as the cost of holidaying abroad becomes ever more expensive. However, the reality is that whatever bonus we may experience comes at a huge cost ... to those in the farming industry who rely on the weather for their livelihoods and also to all of us as water supplies become less abundant even in our often rain soaked land.

For those living in parts of the world where temperatures are generally higher all year round and water is already scarce, or where extreme weather conditions are much more commonplace, the effect of climate change is already having a huge impact. We may complain about rising costs or the lack of produce on the supermarket shelves, but for others it is becoming increasingly difficult simply to survive.

As a church we have supported the work of Christian Aid in bringing relief to the suffering and aid to the needy over many years. Since the global Covid pandemic it has become much harder for Christian Aid, together with many other charities, to raise the funds needed to continue their vital work. This Christian Aid Week,  $14^{th} - 20^{th}$  May, there will not be a local house-to-house collection but there will be the opportunity for you to give in church. Please be as generous as you are able. Thank you.

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### The Coronation of King Charles III and Queen Camilla. 6<sup>th</sup> May 2023

The coronation ceremony is an occasion for pageantry and celebration, but it is also a solemn religious ceremony and has remained essentially the same over a thousand years. For the last 900 years, the ceremony has taken place at Westminster Abbey, London. The service is conducted by the Archbishop of Canterbury, whose task this has almost always been since the Norman Conquest in 1066.

During the ceremony, the Sovereign takes the coronation oath. The form and wording have varied over the centuries. Queen Elizabeth II undertook to rule according to law, to exercise justice with mercy promises symbolised by the four swords in the coronation regalia (the Crown Jewels) - and to maintain the Church of England.

Following the oath the Sovereign is then 'anointed, blessed and consecrated' by the Archbishop, whilst the Sovereign is seated in King Edward's chair (made in 1300, and used by every Sovereign since 1626).

### The anointing oil

The oil has been created using olives harvested from two groves on the Mount of Olives, at the Monastery of Mary Magdalene and the Monastery of the Ascension. The Monastery of Mary Magdalene is the burial place of His Majesty's grandmother, Princess Alice of Greece. The olives were pressed just outside Bethlehem. The oil has been perfumed with essential oils - sesame, rose, jasmine, cinnamon, neroli, benzoin and amber - as well as orange blossom.

In a special ceremony at The Church of the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem, The oil was consecrated by the Patriarch of Jerusalem, His Beatitude Patriarch Theophilos III, and the Anglican Archbishop in Jerusalem, The Most Reverend Hosam Naoum.

#### The Archbishop of Canterbury said:

"I am honoured and grateful that His Beatitude Patriarch Theophilos III and Archbishop Hosam Naoum have consecrated the oil that will be used to anoint His Majesty the King. I want to thank especially His Beatitude for providing this Coronation Oil, which reflects The King's personal family connection with the Holy Land and his great care for its peoples. I am also delighted that the Anglican Archbishop in Jerusalem shared in the consecration of the oil. "Since beginning the planning for the Coronation, my desire has been for a new Coronation Oil to be produced using olive oil from the Mount of Olives. This demonstrates the deep historic link between the Coronation, the Bible and the Holy Land. From ancient kings through to the present day, monarchs have been anointed with oil from this sacred place. As we prepare to anoint The King and The Queen Consort, I pray that they would be guided and strengthened by the Holy Spirit."

#### The orb and sceptre

The Orb is a representation of the sovereign's power. It symbolises the Christian world with its cross mounted on a globe, and the bands of jewels dividing it up into three sections represent the three continents known in medieval times.



The Orb is placed in the right hand of the monarch as they are invested with the symbols of sovereignty. It is then placed on the altar before the moment of crowning.

#### The sceptres

The sovereign is presented with two sceptres - one surmounted by a cross representing temporal power and one surmounted by a dove representing the Holy Spirit. After the investiture the sovereign is crowned.





#### The crown

St Edward's Crown is the crown used at the moment of coronation. It was made for Charles II in 1661, as a replacement for the medieval crown which had been melted down in 1649. The original was thought to date back to the eleventh-century royal saint, Edward the Confessor – the last Anglo-Saxon king of England. At the end of the service this crown is ex-

changed for the Imperial State Crown which is used on ceremonial occasions such as the State Opening of Parliament.

Graham Franklin 1935 - 2023

Graham was born on the 18<sup>th</sup> April 1935 in Calcutta, India. He was the middle of three brothers and one sister, and his father was a Police Inspector. He arrived in the UK with his family in the early 50s, following the death of his mother, and moved to Forest Hill.

Graham trained as an accountant and worked for several firms, one of which gave him the opportunity to work in Sardinia. It was shortly after this that he met Davina. They began to build a life together in Bromley Common, in which time they helped run the youth club at Holy Trinity. Davina and Graham married at Holy Trinity in May 1979 and had three daughters who were involved in the life of the church throughout their childhood, including singing in the choir.

Graham always had a strong connection to Holy Trinity church and to the Christian faith. He was very proud when his three daughters all joined the church choir. He continued his support for the church throughout his life, serving as Church Warden from 1997 to 2002. During this time Graham was especially keen to encourage the church's work with children and young people. He was very popular with the children in Junior Church who would greet him with a cheer when he arrived in the South Room to escort them back into church for the conclusion of the service. He took great comfort in his Christian faith to the end, and regularly asked for updates on people whom he could pray for even whilst himself very poorly in hospital.

Graham is survived by Davina, their 3 daughters and 8 grandchildren.



## Ascension, Pentecost and Trinity

This is the time in the church's year when we celebrate three festivals after Easter: the Ascension, Pentecost and Trinity Sunday. It may seem like an anti-climax after the joy of the resurrection but it is very important time for us to realise what God is doing in our lives today.

Thursday 18<sup>th</sup> May is Ascension Day when we remember that the earthly but risen Jesus had to return to his Father in heaven. As he said to his disciples 'It is for your good that I am going away. Unless I go away, the Counsellor will not come to you; but if I go, I will send him to you' (John 16: 7). He then told them to wait in Jerusalem for the gift of baptism in the Holy Spirit.

On Sunday 28<sup>th</sup> May we celebrate Pentecost when the Holy Spirit descended in power on the disciples in Jerusalem. Because Jesus is no longer present in one place on earth, but is now in heaven with his Father, he could send what he had promised to empower the disciples to 'be my witnesses in Jerusalem, ... and to the ends of the earth' (Acts 1:8). This first gift of the Holy Spirit was spectacular but was just the beginning. He still comes to believers today, sometimes in power but also as a 'still small voice'.

Sunday 4<sup>th</sup> June is Trinity Sunday, after which our church is named. In our morning service we re-affirm our belief in the living God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit: three in one and one in three. The church's year then labels the next Sundays as 'After Trinity ' or 'Ordinary Time' but they should be anything but ordinary. In our lives both at this time and all year round we should be acknowledging the presence of God as creator, redeemer, friend and empowerer.

What are we doing as individuals and as a church to fulfil Jesus' commands to 'love one another as I have loved you' (John 13:34) and to 'Go and make disciples ... teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you'. (Matthew 28: 19,20)?

## **Book Review**

**'What I wish people knew about dementia'** by Wendy Mitchell. Bloomsbury, 2022, £9.99

Wendy was diagnosed with young-onset dementia when she was just 58. The diagnosis did not mark the end of her life, but the beginning of a very different one. In this, her second book, she combines personal stories with research to help her readers understand what it is like to live with dementia.

She looks at how senses and emotions change, or stay the same, and how relationships and communication also change, or stay the same. Each person with dementia is an individual but there are general principles which can be applied to different situations.

Wendy enjoys photography and spends time exploring her local area photographing the changing seasons. She moved to a village soon after her diagnosis and she takes advantage of the quieter environment and the many opportunities for varied walks secure in the knowledge that she is known in the neighbourhood as 'the photography lady'. She acknowledges that not everyone has her advantages but insists that it is possible to make the most of your situation and even live alone with dementia.

She does not shy away from discussing problems. She has bad days which she calls 'hazes' but suggests that what is important is her attitude to them. She says 'the word suggests that I am there underneath all the time, just waiting for the mist to clear again. And it does. The way we address these fogs ... can minimise or maximise what is happening to us. The important thing to remember is that no one coping strategy is the right one. The way we cope with adversity is as individual as we are – with or without dementia.'

This is a very readable book, full of common sense but also inspiration. While not all of us will undertake a skydive for charity, as she has done, we can all learn from her positive attitude to life.

Looking for something cheerful but healthy to brighten the chilly days of this year's damp spring?

The following recipe ticks many boxes – good protein, oily fish (omega 3?), vegetables included, easy to prepare, and works for family meals as well as for entertaining. I hope you like it as much as I do.

#### GINGER AND ASPARAGUS SALMON PARCELS

1/2 tbsp finely grated root ginger
3 tbsp dark soy sauce
1 tbsp clear honey
3 tbsp sweet chilli sauce
4 boneless salmon fillets
1 red onion, very finely sliced
1 red pepper, very finely sliced
300 gr. trimmed asparagus spears

Mix the ginger, soy sauce, honey and chilli sauce in a jug.

Make 4 large foil squares. Mix together the red onion and red pepper and divide between the foil squares. Place a piece of fish on top of the vegetables and pour over the marinade. Divide the asparagus spears and place on top of the fish. Seal each parcel, place on a baking tray and set aside for 15 minutes, or keep chilled until you are ready to cook.

Pre-heat the oven to 190C, fan 170, gas 5, place the fish in the oven and cook for 20 minutes. To serve, place the salmon and asparagus on a warm plate and pour over the sauce. Serve with white or brown basmati rice.

The recipe works well with trout fillets, and you could also think about using thin stem broccoli instead of asparagus.
